- · Listen to your friend
- Tell them you believe them
- Talk to a trusted adult/bring them to a trusted adult

- Reassure them it is NOT their fault

- Do not share their personal information with other peers



In New Jersey, anyone receiving or sharing explicit photos of people under the age of 18 is breaking the law.


There is no law that addresses teen sexting — the photos are considered child sexual abuse images.

20% of teens in the United States have sent or posted nude or semi-nude photos or videos of themselves.

LET'S DEFINE CONSENT

Consent is an agreement between participants to engage in sexual activity. Consent should be clearly communicated.

If someone agrees to an activity under pressure, that is not considered consent because it was not given freely.

People who are intoxicated or incapacitated by drugs or alcohol, or asleep or unconscious, cannot consent to sexual activity. Underage individuals cannot legally consent to sexual activity with older people in most situations.

Unequal power dynamics, such as engaging in sexual activity with an employer, teacher, or coach, also means that consent cannot be freely given.
